

Introduction: 3 Simple Steps Step 1

 First Engaging Sentence: start with a shocking statistic or quotation that you then explain (2+ sentences)







Introduction: 3 Simple Steps

Step 2

Explain what human rights are with a definition or some history, why they are important and why we need to protect them (2-3+ sentences)



Introduction: 3 Simple Steps



Step 3

End introduction with a thesis statement and include an assertion about your three focus human rights (2+ sentences)

Assertion

- A statement or claim an author makes about a specific topic
 - This is your thesis statement in your Introductory Paragraph
 - This is your topic sentence in each of your Body Paragraphs
 - You prove your assertion with evidence

Introduction: Step 1



Introduction: Step 2

Introduction: Step 3

End your introduction with a thesis statement and include your three focus human rights as your main assertion (2+ sentences)

- What statement will you make?
 - Human Rights are being violated/abused/neglected/ ignored in today's world/universally/globally.
- What are your THREE focus Human Rights?
